Recruitment and Workforce Update

For information

The composition of the Ministry workforce has shifted following the conclusion of several of our fixed term and contract staff finishing at the end of 2024.

We have now appointed 62 permanent employees – almost 70% of our permanent positions. As the Ministry matures, we are gaining a better understanding of our workforce needs, and small changes to titles and levels of expertise can be seen in our current permanent establishment compared to that of our initial structure developed back in June/July 2024.

This week our Head of Engagement, Joe Stockman started with the Ministry. Next week, both Head of Digital and Insights, Carol Abernethy and the Chief Economist Kevin Counsell will commence their roles.

Only two permanent manager roles remain to be filled, along with a small number of vacancies in each business group.

Hairdressing and Barbering Regulatory Review

The Hairdressing and Barbering Review team are in the engagement and analysis phase of the review.

Targeted direct engagement with business owners and groups representing regulated parties and regulators is in progress.

As of 28 January, we have received 30 submissions from business owners, 21 from hair and barber professionals, 32 from environmental health officers, and 7 from other interested parties.

		You may want to express a view or discuss this option with the Minister of Finance. While the costs of earlier and more comprehensive data access need to be weighed against the benefits of greater market entry and innovation, this choice also depends on how Ministers weigh up other Crown funding priorities.

Red Tape Submissions - 2024/25 Q2 (Oct-Dec) Summary Report



Since the online portal was launched on 19 November 2024, we have seen a variety of regulatory issues that New Zealanders consider are getting in the way of their lives and businesses. We have considered the issues raised with us and have decided which ones we will investigate further (either ourselves or alongside other agencies). The submissions have been across a wide variety of sectors but we have seen some common themes around Resource Management Act and zoning decisions, the building consent system, anti-money laundering requirements, temporary traffic management and small food businesses. All of the submissions have helped us to identify potential areas for future sector reviews - even those that we might not have progressed to an investigation. They have also led to engagement with other agencies and increased visibility of regulatory red tape. Our specific interventions on a number of issues have already led to positive change (see highlights section) and our investigations into the red tape tips will provide broader insights and practical solutions to improve the lives of New Zealanders.

In 2024, the Ministry received 491 red tape submissions. 55 of these were before the portal launched on 19 November. These are the top themes we've seen come through the portal since its launch:

Small cake/food business submissions relate to the registration and certification fees for these small food manufacturers being too high and $\frac{s \cdot 9(2)(g)(0)}{s}$ to larger businesses, e.g., restaurants.


Temporary traffic management submissions are varied, but largely relate to cost and the confusing and inhibiting rules in this area.

Anti-Money Laundering submissions largely relate to disproportionate compliance burden for small, medium and large businesses and the impact on individuals trying to transact business.

Building consents submitters raise concerns about issues with consenting for office buildings through to tiny homes.

Some of the other themes we're seeing relate to **vehicle licencing**, application of the **RMA**, **zoning**, and the call for a regulation change to enable **electronic controlled drug registers**.

Highlights for 2024 - cutting red tape

Last year, the Ministry investigated a large number of red tape tips we heard from businesses and individual members of the public. In the following examples, the Ministry has added value to regulated markets and the New Zealand economy by investigating red tape issues and finding practical solutions.

Buy now pay late

Our investigation identified that the implemented regulatory reforms to the Credit Contracts and Consumer Finance Act 2003 (CCCFA) to Buy Now Pay Later (BNPL) providers would likely have an adverse impact on consumers. Off the back of this, Cabinet approved the Minister for Regulation's recommended approach which aims to avoid higher compliance costs for BNPL providers being passed on to consumers.

Industrial Hemp (iHemp)

Industrial hemp has a number of potential uses across various sectors. Working alongside the New Zealand Hemp Industries Association (NZHIA), we have made recommendations for progressing changes to the way industrial hemp is regulated in New Zealand. Advice on this will shortly be considered by Cabinet, and we believe this change will support growth in this industry.

Flour Dust

The Ministry worked with commercial bakers and WorkSafe to analyse whether a proposed change to the current Workplace Exposure Standard for flour dust would deliver benefits to the baking industry, or create unneeded compliance burden. By applying the principles of good regulatory design, the Ministry worked with WorkSafe who agreed to pause the change to further assess if it is fit-for-purpose.

- We worked with the Ministry of Justice to ensure they consider current income and asset thresholds that determine the process for administering property on behalf of someone lacking decision-making capacity. In September 2024 positive changes were made to the financial thresholds.
